Course Description:

This course traces the history of Russia from ancient times to the present. It looks at events on the territory which today is Russia from Middle Ages, through imperial expansion, reforms, revolutions into the 21st century. It explores domestic, regional, international factors, and how this complex history has been narrated.

Prerequisite(s):

There are no prerequisites for this course.

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. The decision may not appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

Course Syllabus:

This lecture course will be held asynchronously, and the OWL site will be our virtual classroom. Please familiarize yourself with the course site. Every week students will be expected to complete the required readings, review the lessons, and participate in a small group discussion/activity. In Week 5 a film will be screened. There will be two written assignments: a film review and an essay, and a final exam.

Lessons and discussion questions/group activity will be posted on the course OWL site every Wednesday at 11:30. Students can view the lessons at their convenience. It is recommended that the readings be completed

ahead of watching the lessons. The class will be divided into small groups (8-10 per group) and each group will be required to meet each week after the lessons have been posted, to discuss the provided questions or complete the group activity. This will constitute the participation marks. Each group can decide how they want to meet, which platform they find works best (Facebook, Google Meets, Zoom, other) and post their result in the Forum tab. Detailed instructions will be provided.

Learning Outcomes:

At the end of this class students will be able to:

- Demonstrate an understanding of the main developments in Russian history;
- Explain the inter-connectedness of national and international history;
- Critically evaluate competing historical narratives and sources;
- Explain the meaning of concepts such as empire, state, nation;
- Express themselves clearly and analytically in written assignments.
