HISTORY/WS 2140 Women in Canadian History: Changing Roles and Diverse Social Realities Summer 2021 ON-LINE May-July 2021

Course Description:

A survey of Canadian women's history from first European contact to the 1960s, with a focus on the realities of women's lived experience.

Antirequisite(s):

History 2182A/B, History 2208E; Women's Studies 2139A/B; Women's Studies 2140

Course Syllabus:

This course is designed to be an overview of women's history in Canada from the first days of European settlement to the end of the 20th Century. Its focus is social history, that is, examining the realities of women's everyday lives. Emphasis will be placed on examining a variety of historical sources. Factors such as race, class, ethnicity and sexuality will be important themes. At the end, students will have a sense of how women's diverse lived experiences have changed throughout Canadian history, and how they have remained the same.

The course learning objectives are:

- To gain an understanding of a broad Canadian women's history from before the arrival of Europeans until today with an emphasis on social history and the lives of both ordinary and extraordinary women
- To learn how to extract historical meaning from diverse sources
- To gain an understanding of how women's roles and gender roles changed and developed over time
- To understand how factors such as class, race, sexuality and ethnicity effected women's historical realities over time

Course Materials:

Methods of Evaluation:

The on-line class discussion will be held on the course webpage in OWL. There will be 11 weeks available to post discussions. Students will be assigned two marks for each week they post a **relevant** comment based on the assigned reading, up to a total of 20%. (You can miss one week's discussion without penalty.) Discussion forums will be open on Monday 9 am and close Friday at 4 pm. Questions will be given every week to guide you in your posts.

The video response assignments will consist of short responses to one of the videos on a list that have been assigned for viewing in previous weeks. There will be four of these short assignments during the term. They will require you to reflect on what have you learned about the social history of women in Canada from watching a particular video.

The oral history assignment will require you to undertake an oral history project by interviewing a woman over the age of 70 and writing an essay reflecting on if and how women's lives have changed over the course of her lifetime.

Students will be provided with more detailed instructions about all of these assignments.

Accommodation for missed assignment deadlines with a Self Reported Absence:

If a student reports a SRA for an assignment (i.e. an essay) the new due date will be 48 hours after the SRA was submitted. For example, if you complete a SRA on March 19 at 3 pm, your new due date will be March 21 at 3 pm.
