Course Description

Canadian popular culture: poor-quality imitation of America, or crucial element of Canadian identity? This course traces the evolution of Canadian popular culture by glimpsing into music, film, television, sport and more. What was enjoyed, why, and was it "Canadian?"

Course Syllabus

Canadian popular culture is regularly derided as "inferior" and "derivative" of "pop culture" from south of the 49th parallel. Was (is?) that the case? We trace the evolution of "Canadian popular culture" through offering glimpses into music, film and television, sport, consumption and more. What was enjoyed, why, and was it "Canadian?" Voices, images, and more reveal both impressive originality and sycophantic imitation. We examine *popular* culture in various guises – from radio and television to film to music, sports, consumption of various products and more. The character of that cultural product; the role of changing tastes and technologies; the influence of regulation versus free enterprise; national versus international perspectives; and the changing "mass" market all come into play. History 2124 suggests "our" culture is more multifaceted than the caricatures provided by either nationalist "cheerleading" or dismissive rejection.
