COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course explores the relationships of Christians, Muslims and Jews between the era prior to the fall of Constantinople (1453) and the end of the Great Turkish War (1699). Judaism, Christianity and Islam all trace their origins to a common ancient ancestor, Abraham. After the mid-fifteenth century, societies rooted in these traditions argued, fought and collaborated in a remarkable era of cultural achievement, economic dynamism and military conflict.

COURSE SYLLABUS

In this class students will build the following competencies and skills:

- 1. Identify and describe key events and concepts in early modern history
- 2. Evaluate diverse forms of historical evidence and cultivate interpretive skills
- 3. Strengthen writing skills in history and related disciplines
- 4. Engage with faculty and peers in a collaborative, respectful atmosphere

METHODS OF EVALUATION

Students must submit all written assignments and complete the final exam to pass the course.
